Egypt is ranked first in the world in palm production, and the people of Dahshur village are trained to pack, package, and sell it for tourism. The Dahshur archaeological area contains three pyramids dating back to the reign of the kings (Amenhotep II and III, and Senusret III).. Their importance stems from the fact that they reflect the architectural development that pyramid construction underwent in ancient Egypt.

By upholding traditions and rituals, Dahshur protects the nation's cultural legacy and identity. It also offers agricultural activities, crafts, and handicrafts, and a variety of economic activities, making it a popular tourist destination... for this reason, we offer a trip to the Dahshur area to explore its monuments and nature.

Dahshur pyramids, lunch in an Egyptian village by donkey

From your hotel, you will be taken to begin a tour that combines archaeology, history, nature, and the traditions of the rural community. The three pyramids of Dahshur—the Black Pyramid, constructed by King Amenhotep III, the Red Pyramid and the Bent Pyramid, constructed by King Sneferu—are close to the village of Manshiyet Dahshur. They are a component of the World Heritage Site Memphis Necropolis. These pyramids, which extend approximately 3.5 kilometers in diameter, were opened to the public in late 1996 and

contain historical components from the Fourth and Twelfth Dynasties.

Dense rural vegetation, Dahshur's seasonal pond and migratory birds, and ancient monuments with history. According to the General Authority for Tourism Development, Dahshur has been out of sight for many years, as it is the complete opposite of the tourist hub that tourists usually take during their trip to Egypt.

Another landmark of the village is the narrow market street, which contains a number of traditional cafes, bakeries, and craft workshops such as carpentry workshops and palm basket making workshops. In Dahshur, you will also find a village called Manshiyat Kasab, the smallest village in the area. Enjoy lunch after a stroll through this unique area. You will be driven to your accommodation at the conclusion of the tour.
