Learn about the story of Caliph Al-Ma'mun, the first excavator and explorer inside the pyramid. An opening in the Great Pyramid is named after him, as he was unable to discover the original opening due to the limestone covering.

Egyptians are builders with a strong religious bent, as seen by the past being exposed in the present. Despite being named after Sheikh Ahmed bin Ali al-Rifai, the mosque does not contain his grave. He died in the Iraqi village of Umm Ubaidah in 578 AH/1182 AD. But the term was first applied to "Zawiya al-Rifai," the old zawiya (mosque corner) that stood where the present mosque now stands. The sheikh buried there, Ali Abu Shabak, a descendent of al-Rifai, was given this name. The same name was then applied to the contemporary mosque.

The construction was completed in 1363 AD, seven years after it began in 1356 AD... Before construction was finished, the sultan was assassinated, and his corpse was never discovered... He was not buried in the mausoleum he had built specifically for the mosque; instead, his two sons were buried there later. Learn more with us.

On this day, our company will take you in a modern private car to and from the hotel. In the morning, we begin with a guide providing rich information about the three pyramids, starting with their construction and continuing through the developments the area has witnessed. Air-conditioned vehicles will next take you to the Sphinx, which is believed to be a representation of the sun deity Horemakhet, as shown by the temple across from the monument, where religious ceremonies were held.

Throughout their history, the Egyptians held this in high regard because they saw it as a statue of the god Horemakhet, or Horus on the horizon, a representation of Atum, the greatest Egyptian deity and symbol of the waning sun. Discover more about the Sphinx's alternative theories.

Al-Rifai Mosque is one of Cairo's most famous mosques. It is distinguished by its unique architectural design, meticulously detailed decorations, and massive columns. Known as the "Cemetery of Kings and Princes," it houses the burial sites of King Farouk, Queen Ferial, Khoshyar Hanem, Khedive Ismail, King Fuad I, the Shah of Iran, and Jananyar Hanem.
