Itinerary

Day 1: Fly to Luxor / Luxor East Tours

You can expect to be driven to Cairo Airport from your Cairo hotel so you can catch your flight to Luxor. Upon arrival, we will start from Karnak. In Karnak, enjoy a visit Chapel of Achoris: The construction of this chapel dates back to the reign of Psammoutis (29th Dynasty) and it was usurped by his successor Achoris, who completed its decoration. Triple Chapel of Repose of Seti II

The three chapels were dedicated to the three boats of the Theban Triad. The central chapel is dedicated to Amun-Re; in front of this chapel were two statues of the king, of which only bases are left. The chapel of Mut is to the left and that of Khonsu to the right. The chapel walls are adorned with scenes of sacrifice.

Savor a meat-and-red sauce meal from Egypt, such as Egyptian fatteh. It is well known that the processes used to make Egyptian fatteh vary by region. This recipe gives the red sauce a delicious crimson color by combining it with vinegar and garlic. Try our Egyptian-style dish with your family and savor the mouthwatering flavor.

Next, head to Luxor Temple. Amenhotep III constructed it in the fourteenth century BC.. The courtyard at that time held two towers and an entrance when columns and the first pylon (entrance) were erected by Ramses II. Two of these statues were restored to their original location after being destroyed in previous eras.

Day 2: Luxor west tours / Hot air balloon / Fly Back Cairo

We'll pick you up from your hotel before dawn so you may take a hot air balloon flight and see the sunrise. The balloon takes off at a known airport in front of Hatshepsut Temple, west of Luxor. In essence, landing is an adventure-oriented tourism activity because it doesn't always take place in the same place but rather varies each time according on the wind direction and strength.

Then you will enjoy a meal that can be enjoyed with precision... Koshari is one of the famous popular Egyptian dishes, and is distinguished by its high nutritional value.

The Valley of Kings will be followed by a visit to Deir el-Bahari. She was not the only one for whom this shrine was ever created. Portions of the temple were dedicated to the gods Anubis and Hathor, as well as her father, King Thutmose I. A sky-opening shrine was dedicated to the sun god Ra-Horakhty, according to the Ministry of Tourism and Antiquities. There was also a great place dedicated to Amun.

Have fun when you visit Medinet Habu. According to Nubi Gad, a tour guide from West Luxor, King Ramses III constructed the huge temple of Medinet Habu, also called the House of Millions of Years. He explained that Phoenix House, also comprising the Three Hypostyle Halls and the Temple of Ramses III, form part of Medinet Habu.

Enjoy a visit to the Ramesseum. It consists of the remains of roads and broken Osirian columns, in addition to a huge pylon, half of which has collapsed. In addition, the temple includes the remains of one of the largest statues in the world, which is of King Ramesses II, which is estimated to weigh 1,000 tons and is 16 meters long. Time to get back to your accommodation.
