As you cross the Nile to the West Bank, you will discover the necropolis of the ancient city of Thebes. You will make a quick stop at the Visitor Center when you arrive to the Valley of the Kings, which is the final resting place of the kings of Thebes (ancient Luxor). Your guide will show you what to search for within the ornately adorned rooms, but guides are not allowed inside the tombs. A separate fee must be paid in person if you want to see King Tutankhamun's tomb. The Temple of Hatshepsut, one of Egypt's most magnificent structures, will be your next stop after leaving the scorching sands of the Valley of the Kings.

Your guide will narrate the story of Queen Hatshepsut and the temple's history. You will have plenty of time to browse at your own leisure as you meander through the roomy courtyards and see the intricate hieroglyphic decor.

Before going on to Luxor, there is time for a brief photo stop at the Colossi of Memnon, which marks the site of Amenhotep III's funeral temple.. You can also visit the alabaster factory and purchase real items if you'd want, but these two massive statues are all that's left of the original complex.

Highlights of a Private Day Tour of Luxor

Enjoy a trip with us that will transport you from your hotel to the West Bank to visit the Valley of the Kings. You will stop at the following places while in the Valley of the Kings:

Tomb of Ramses II (optional), he established his funerary temple and his tomb, which bears the number 17 of the Valley of the Kings. Discovered in 1817, it is the most beautiful, longest, and deepest of the tombs in the Valley of the Kings, whose sumptuous relief and paintings are the work of great artists.

In the funerary chamber is a remarkable sarcophagus of translucent alabaster, unparalleled in the world. The basin is intact, but not the lid decorated with a figure of the king depicted lying down, savagely broken by robbers. His mummy is the best-preserved, found in 1881 in the hiding place of royal mummies at Deir El Bahari. This mummy was remolded after the first looting of the tomb.

You'll then visit the Valley of the Queens, where you can explore 120 years since the discovery of Queen Nefertari's tomb in Luxor Governorate by an Italian archaeological mission headed by Sicciaparelli. The tomb was discovered in 1904, giving the world a unique glimpse into ancient Egyptian art, many of whose secrets remain hidden to this day...

Then we move to Deir el-Bahari. After completing your tour, enjoy lunch to be able to continue your trip. Now it's time to visit the Luxor Museum so you can take a tour inside the Luxor Museum, the largest collection of artifacts..

On the West Bank, in the city of Qurna, we shall relocate to the Temple of Habu. It is the temple of the great city of Habu, which is called the House of Millions of Years. It is the temple that King Ramses III built to perform funerary rituals and to worship the god Amun.

After visiting the two statues of Memnon, you will be transferred to your hotel after this long and informative day.
