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Day 6: Edfu and Kom Ombo Temples

On day six of your journey, you will cruise to Edfu and then visit after breakfast.

The Temple of <u>Edfu</u>, dedicated to the deity Horus and located on the west bank of the Nile, is one of the most complete ancient Egyptian temples. Since <u>King Ptolemy III</u>'s rule in 237 BC, the temple has been under construction for almost 180 years.

The Kom Ombo temple derives from the mythology of the monarch of "Emboa," who called the city after him today, and it consists of two syllables: (Kom), which indicates what is above the ground, and (Ombo), which is the name of the valley's king or ruler.

Then transfer back to your Nile cruise.

Breakfast, lunch, and Dinner are served.

Day 7: Aswan tour

During the seventh day you will be served breakfast before being escorted to the concept of erecting the High Dam in the higher reaches of the Nile dates back to the creation of an artificial lake of fresh water, and it was decided to begin construction in 1953, with a committee created to produce a plan for the project. One of the world's leading businesses.

And the 42-meter-long <u>Unfinished Obelisk</u> rests on the ground in the northern corner of Aswan's obelisk quarry, where it was discovered in 1921.

Finally, there is the <u>Philae Temple</u>, this temple devoted to the goddess Isis was submerged and reconstructed in a new position on the <u>Agilika island</u>, some 500 meters from its original location on the island of Philae.

After that, return to your Nile cruise.

Day 8: Sail to Abu Simbel

Begin the eighth day of your tour package with a delicious breakfast, then transfer and begin your journey by sailing to <u>Abu Simbel</u>, which was built by King Ramses II (about 1303 BC - 1213 BC), the most famous king of Egypt from the era of the modern state, and it is believed that he sat on the throne in his late teenage years and ruled Egypt for 67 years from 1279 BC to 1213 BC.

When you return to your Nile cruise, pack your belongings and travel to Cairo. Overnight stay in a Cairo hotel.

Day 9: Free day

Day 10: Travel to Fayoum

First, eat breakfast, and then proceed to Fayoum.

To begin, <u>Wadi Al-Hitan</u> is part of the 400-square-kilometer Wadi El-Rayan Reserve near Fayoum, around 150 kilometers from Cairo. The Egyptian government proclaimed <u>Wadi El-Rayan</u> a natural reserve in 1989 to protect the region and the valuable fossils that show Wadi El-Hitan was submerged in water and inhabited by marine species 40 million years ago.

And have lunch in Tunis village.

Breakfast and lunch are the main meals of the day.

Day 11: Last day at Fayoum

After your delicious breakfast, transfer to the first location, which is.

Begin your day with a visit to <u>Lake Qaroun</u>, which was designated as a wildlife reserve in 1989. It has a total size of 1,385 square kilometers. It is the remains of the ancient Morris Lake and is one of the world's oldest natural lakes. It is recognized around the world for the presence of marine, river, and continental fossil beds going back about 40 million years, including the massive Fayoum animal that resembled rhinos.

At the end of your journey, visit Wadi al-Rayyan, which is regarded one of Egypt's most significant natural reserves, alongside Ras Muhammad, St. Catherine, and Mount Elba. Wadi al-Rayyan was named after a monarch named al-Rayyan ibn al-Walid, who stayed in the region with his army for a spell, irrigating water from the area's natural springs. This was agreed upon by the Bedouins. The name was discovered to have ancient Egyptian origins on an antique papyrus.

Travel to Cairo and spend the night.

Breakfast and lunch are the main meals of the day.

Day 12: Baharyia Oasis

Early in the morning, have breakfast, and go to Baharyia Oasis to view the white desert. The reserve is distinguished by the beauty of the sand dunes, the geological formations of the white limestone rocks, and the peculiar fossils they hold.

The White Desert is covered in a white chalk ground with geological structures in the shape of snow-white chalk columns generated by the wind and steep hills, giving the region a unique geological and ecological setting.

Then proceed to the dark desert. The <u>Black Desert</u> is the source of its name. Of fact, the name of this desert comes from the mountains and plateaus that are covered with black powder as a result of volcanic eruptions that have dried up over millions of years.

Then you will be transferred back to Cairo and spend the night at a hotel there.

Breakfast and lunch are the main meals of the day.

Day 13: Final departure

After breakfast, transfer to Cairo International Airport to catch your flight, at which point our service will come to an end.
